Cast Your Vote On Nickels for Know-how!

Nickels for Know-How is a 65 year old voluntary assessment on feed and fertilizer produced and purchased in North Carolina. The North Carolina Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services collects the money from the manufacturers of feed and fertilizer. Manufacturers build the cost (three nickels per ton) into the price of their products. The money is transferred to the North Carolina Agricultural Foundation. The funds are then used to support research, teaching, and extension projects at NC State University.

Nickels for Know-How funds help rural agricultural students come to and stay at NC State. They help support many different programs such as CALS spend a day at State, Student Ambassadors, workshops for high school vocational agriculture teacher, on-campus internships, and annual scholarships. In addition, this program has supported a variety of research projects that have benefited farmers and agribusinesses.

Voters can renew this program on November 17th. By voting "Yes" they can assess 15 cents for each ton of feed and fertilizer they purchase.

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Beef Cattle Al Class Postponed Until Spring 2023



The Beef Cattle Artificial Insemination (A.I.) class previously scheduled for November has been postponed until spring at the request of our partnering host representative with ABS Global Inc. However, we are still exploring interests for offering this workshop. A.I. is one potential tool that can greatly improve beef herd genetics. In this workshop, participants will be able to learn how to A.I. cattle and will gain hands-on training to help develop their skills.

The cost of the class will be \$450 per participant. This helps cover the cost of the cattle needed for the workshop. Additionally, each participant receives a majority of that cost back as a credit to purchase beef cattle semen from ABS Global Inc. Participation will be limited and will be on a first-come basis when the class is offered. Yancey County Voluntary Ag District Update

The Yancey County Voluntary Agriculture District Program will soon be reinstated. This program is established by Yancey County Ordinance, and has several benefits for farm and forest land owners.

Enrolling farms into Voluntary Agriculture Districts (VADs):

- Encourage the preservation and protection of farmland and working forests
- Allows landowners to publicly recognize their farms.
- Establishes an Agriculture Advisory Board in the County
- May protect farms from negative impacts, such as waivers of water and sewer assessments and public hearings for proposed condemnation
- Allows for Enhanced Voluntary Agriculture Districts to protect farms from development for 10 years.

The Yancey County Commission has appointed members to re-establish a working Agriculture Advisory Board. The board will soon be meeting to begin reinstating the VAD Enrollment program in Yancey County. We are also in the process of planning VAD informational meetings in 2023!
